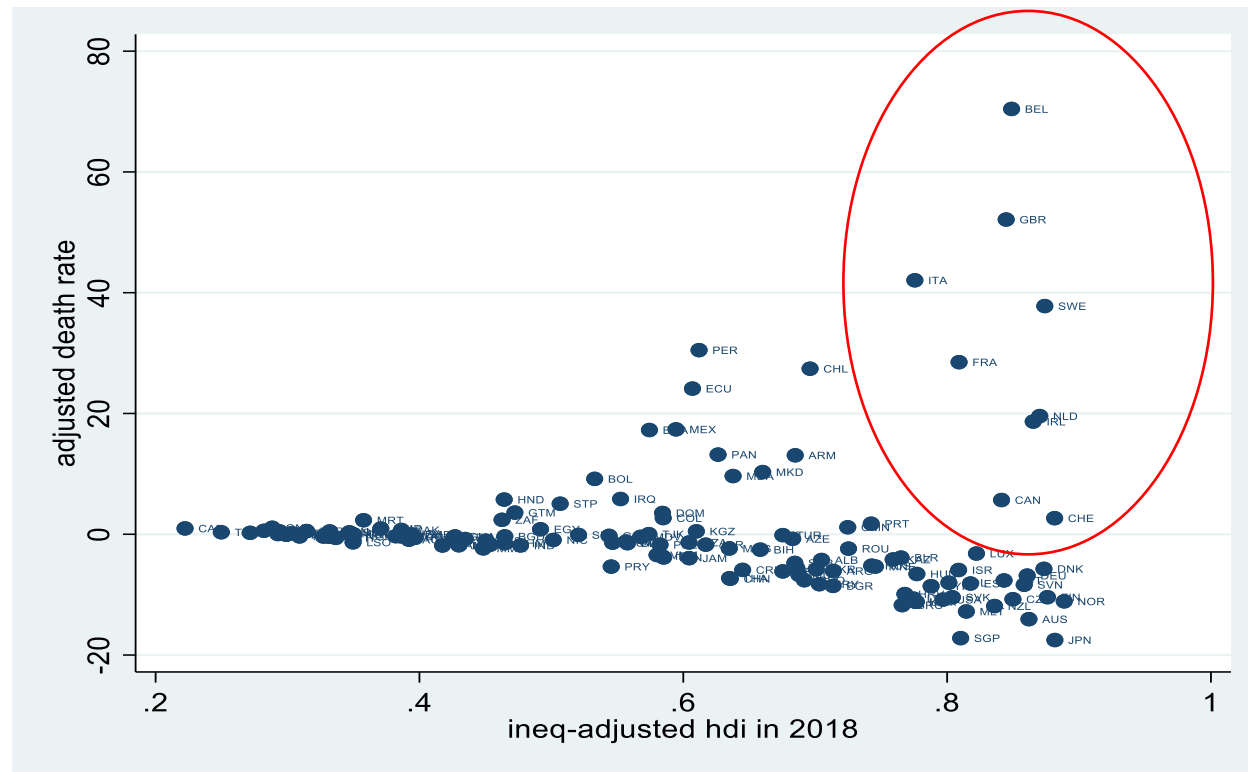

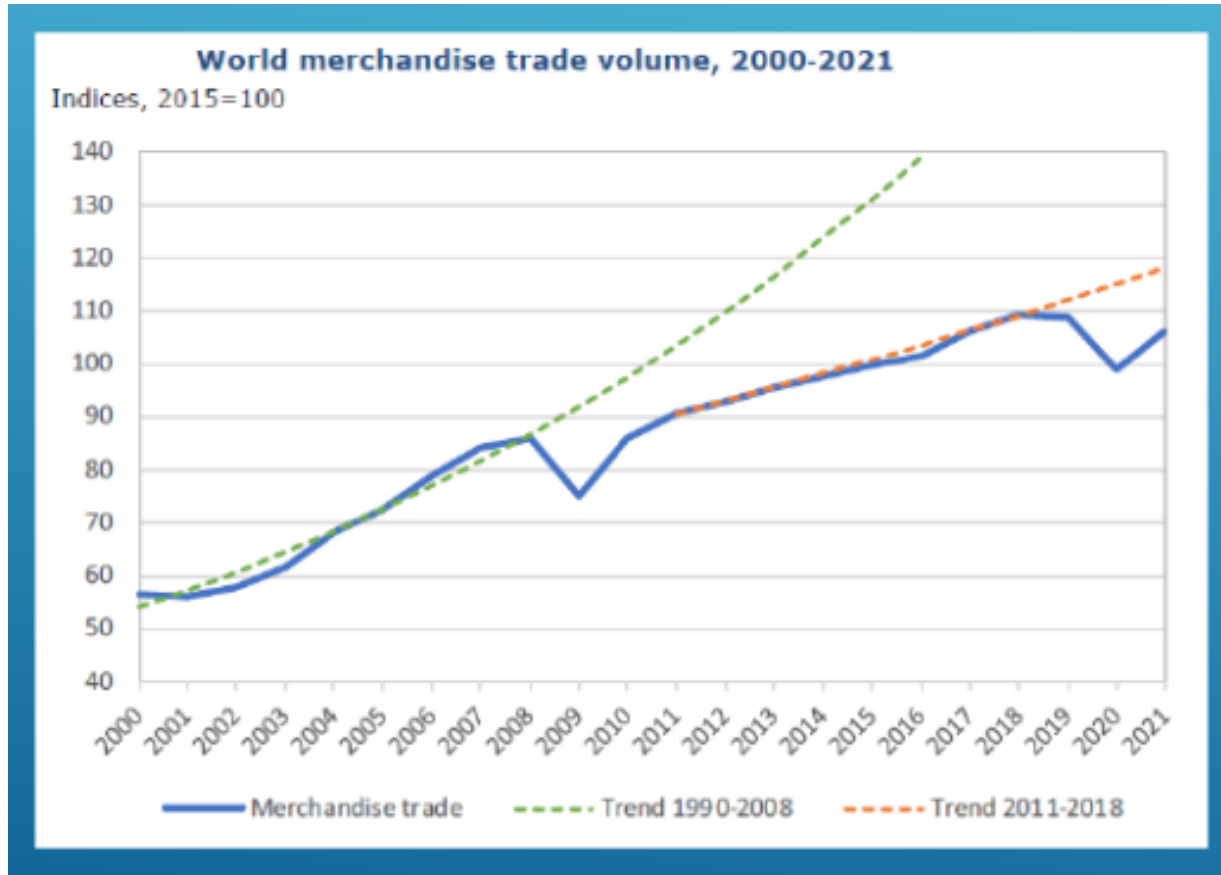
- A lot of information on the global picture

 - Korean-style measures not feasible in most developing countries
 - A wider perspective essential to strengthen health systems, UHC, and PFM capacity

International comparison of covid19 death rates



- apparent positive association b/w HDI and death rates
- Huge outliers in western Europe
- The fundamental relationship still stands to reason
- Similar patterns with other measures of development (SDG scores and Ease of Doing Business)

Long and deep shadows and interdependencies



- Slower growth in trade after the apparent recovery from 2008 global financial crisis
- Do we have a similar pattern in income/productivity growth?
- Why?
 - Lasting impacts on human development
 - Aggravated income inequality with political repercussions
- Development cooperation a global public good, especially investments for inclusive human development
